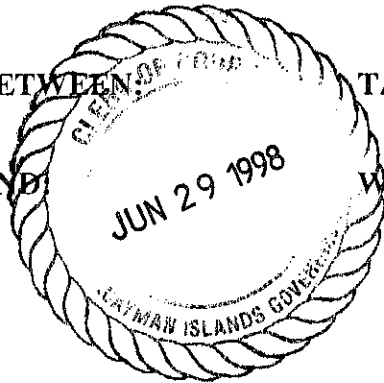

THIS WRIT OF SUMMONS has been issued against you by the above-named Plaintiff in respect of the claim set out on the next page.

Within 14 days after the service of this Writ on you, counting the day of service, you must either satisfy the claim or return to the Court Office, P.O. Box 495G, George Town, Grand Cayman, the accompanying Acknowledgment of Service stating therein whether you intend to contest these proceedings.

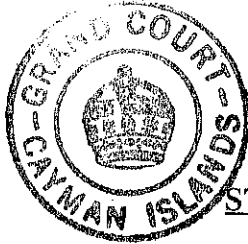
If you fail to satisfy the claim or to return the Acknowledgment within the time stated, or if you return the Acknowledgment without stating therein an intention to contest the proceedings, the Plaintiff may proceed with the action and judgment may be entered against you forthwith without further notice.

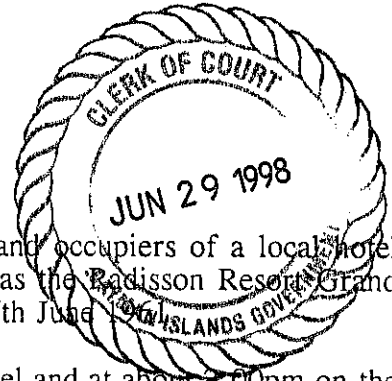

STATEMENT OF CLAIM



1. The Defendant's were at all material times the owners and occupiers of a local hotel situated on West Bay Road, Grand Cayman and known as the Radisson Resort Grand Cayman ("the Hotel"). The Plaintiff was born on the 27th June 1968.
2. The Plaintiff was at all material times a visitor at the Hotel and at about 2.00pm on the 30th October 1995 the Plaintiff left her room to get some ice and slipped on a wet and slippery floor and fell.
3. The matters complained of were caused by the negligence of the Defendant, its servants or agents.

PARTICULARS OF NEGLIGENCE

- (1) Failing to warn the Plaintiff of the wet floor or that the floor was slippery and dangerous.
 - (2) Failing to soak up the water or apply sand to the floor or take any other steps to prevent the floor from being slippery and dangerous.
4. By reason of the matters aforesaid the Plaintiff has suffered pain, injury, loss and damage.

PARTICULARS OF INJURIES

- (1) Displaced fracture of the left radial head.

PARTICULARS OF SPECIAL DAMAGE

- (1) Loss of earnings from 2 November 1995 to 14 November 1995: US\$4,475.00
- (2) Medical fees: US\$6,011.21

US\$10,486.21

5. The Plaintiff is entitled to and claims interest pursuant to section 34 of The Judicature Law on all damages awarded herein at the prescribed rate payable and for such period as the Court thinks just.

AND THE PLAINTIFF CLAIMS:-

1. Damages;
2. Interest thereon at the prescribed rate and for such period as the Court thinks just pursuant to The Judicature Law;

3. Further and/or other relief;
4. Costs.

DIRECTIONS FOR ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF SERVICE
OF WRIT OF SUMMONS

1. The accompanying form of *Acknowledgment of Service* should be completed by an Attorney acting on behalf of the Defendant or by the Defendant if acting in person.

After completion it must be delivered or sent by post to the Law Courts, P.O. Box 495G, George Town, Grand Cayman.

2. A Defendant who states in his Acknowledgment of Service that he intends to contest the proceedings *must also serve a defence* on the Attorney for the Plaintiff (or on the Plaintiff if acting in person).

If a Statement of Claim is indorsed on the Writ (i.e. the words "Statement of Claim" appear on the top of page 2), the Defence must be served within 14 days after the time for acknowledging service of the Writ, unless in the meantime a summons for judgment is served on the Defendant.

If the Statement of Claim is not indorsed on the Writ, the Defence need not be served until 14 days after a Statement of Claim has been served on the Defendant.

If the Defendant fails to serve his defence within the appropriate time, the Plaintiff may enter judgment against him without further notice.

3. A *Stay of Execution* against the Defendant's goods may be applied for where the Defendant is unable to pay the money for which any judgment is entered. If a Defendant to an action for a debt or liquidated demand (i.e. a fixed sum) who does not intend to contest the proceedings states, in answer to Question 3 in the Acknowledgment of Service, that he intends to apply for a stay, execution will be stayed for 14 days after his Acknowledgment, but he must, within that time, *issue a Summons* for a stay of execution, supported by an affidavit of his means. The affidavit should state any offer which the Defendant desires to make for payment of the money by instalments or otherwise.

Notes for Guidance

1. Each Defendant (if there are more than one) is required to complete an Acknowledgment of Service and return it to the Courts Office.
2. For the purpose of calculating the period of 14 days for acknowledging service, a writ served on the Defendant personally is treated as having been served on the day it was delivered to him.
3. Where the Defendant is sued in a name different from his own, the form must be completed by him with the addition in paragraph 1 of the words "sued as (*the name stated on the Writ of Summons*)".
4. Where the Defendant is a FIRM and an attorney is not instructed, the form must be completed by a PARTNER by name, with the addition in paragraph 1 of the description "Partner in the firm of (.....)" after his name.
5. Where the Defendant is sued as an individual TRADING IN A NAME OTHER THAN HIS OWN, the form must be completed by him with the addition in paragraph 1 of the description "trading as (.....)" after his name.
6. Where the Defendant is a LIMITED COMPANY the form must be completed by an Attorney or by someone authorised to act on behalf of the Company, but the Company can take no further step in the proceedings without an Attorney acting on its behalf.
7. Where the Defendant is a MINOR or a MENTAL PATIENT, the form must be completed by an Attorney acting for a guardian *ad litem*.
8. A Defendant acting in person may obtain help in completing the form at the Courts Office.
