Within Fourteen days (14) after the service of this Writ on you, counting the day of service, you must either satisfy the claim or return to the Court Office, P.O. Box 495 G, George Town, Grand Cayman, the accompanying Acknowledgment of Service stating therein whether you intend to contest these proceedings.

If you fail to satisfy the claim or to return the Acknowledgment within the time stated, or if you return the Acknowledgment without stating therein an intention to contest the proceedings, the Plaintiff may proceed with the action and judgment may be entered against you forthwith without further notice.

NOTE - This Writ may not be served later than 4 calendar months (or, if leave is required to effect service out of the jurisdiction, 6 months) beginning with the date of issue unless renewed by order of the Court.

ENDORSEMENT

The Plaintiff's claim against the Defendant is for the sum of CI\$9,300.00 plus interest being the sum owed by the Defendant pursuant to an agreement made on or about the 1st November 1999 whereby the Defendant undertook, *inter alia*, to pay the Plaintiff rent in relation to Apartment No. 6, Tropical Haven, Tropical Gardens, Grand Cayman.

STATEMENT OF CLAIM

1. The Plaintiff is a Caymanian who resides at 3 Canal Lane, Crewe Road, George Town, Grand Cayman and has as her postal address, P.O. Box 604 George Town, Grand Cayman.
2. The Defendant is a Caymanian whose current address is unknown but the Defendant works at the Bank of Bermuda, Dr. Roy's Drive, Grand Cayman.
3. By a Tenancy Agreement made the 1st November 1999 the Plaintiff agreed to let to the Defendant all that premises known as Apartment No. 6, Tropical Haven, Tropical Gardens, Grand Cayman upon the terms and conditions contained therein. It was a condition of such agreement that the Defendant would pay to the Plaintiff a monthly rental of CI\$1,400.00 payable in advance on the 1st day of each month.
4. In or around early 2000 the Defendant commenced being delinquent with his payments in relation to the rent. The position became so bad that the Plaintiff had to ask the Defendant to vacate the property which he did on the 31st May 2000.
5. The Defendant still owes to the Plaintiff rent for the months of December 1999 and January 2000 to May 2000, with the exception of \$500.00 paid on 3rd February 2000.

6. The Defendant's indebtedness to the Plaintiff was acknowledged by him in writing on 4th February 2000, the 14th April 2000 and 25th April 2000 but despite assurances of payment and promises to repay, none of the aforesaid sums have been repaid.

AND the Plaintiff claims:

1. The sum of CI\$7,900.00
2. Pre and post judgment interest pursuant to Section 34 of the Judicature Law (1995 Revision) and Judgment Debt (Rate of Interest) Rules.
3. Costs
4. Further and or other relief.

If within the time for returning the Acknowledgement of Service the Defendant pays the total amount claimed of CI\$7,900.00 (and fixed costs of CI\$500.00 and filing fees of CI\$150.00) further proceedings will be stayed. The monies must be paid to the plaintiff's attorneys.

DIRECTIONS FOR ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF SERVICE
OF WRIT OF SUMMONS

1. The accompanying form of *Acknowledgment of Service* should be completed by an Attorney acting on behalf of the Defendant or by the Defendant if acting in person

After completion it must be delivered or sent by post to the Law Courts, P.O. Box 495G, George Town, Grand Cayman

2. A Defendant who states in his Acknowledgment of Service that he intends to contest the proceedings *must also serve a defence* on the Attorney for the Plaintiff (or on the Plaintiff if acting in person).

If a Statement of Claim is indorsed on the Writ (i.e. the words "Statement of Claim" appear on the top of page 2), the Defence must be served within 14 days after the time for acknowledging service of the Writ, unless in the meantime a summons for judgment is served on the Defendant.

If the Statement of Claim is not indorsed on the Writ, the Defence need not be served until 14 days after a Statement of Claim has been served on the Defendant

If the Defendant fails to serve his defence within the appropriate time, the Plaintiff may enter judgment against him without further notice.

3. A *Stay of Execution* against the Defendant's goods may be applied for where the Defendant is unable to pay the money for which any judgment is entered. If a Defendant to an action for a debt or liquidated demand (i.e. a fixed sum) who does not intend to contest the proceedings states, in answer to Question 3 in the Acknowledgment of Service, that he intends to apply for a stay, execution will be stayed for 14 days after his Acknowledgment, but he must, within that time, *issue a Summons* for a stay of execution, supported by an affidavit of his means. The affidavit should state any offer which the Defendant desires to make for payment of the money by installments or otherwise.

Notes for Guidance

1. Each Defendant (if there are more than one) is required to complete an Acknowledgment of Service and return it to the Courts Office.
2. For the purpose of calculating the period of 14 days for acknowledging service, a writ served on the Defendant personally is treated as having been served on the day it was delivered to him.
3. Where the Defendant is sued in a name different from his own, the form must be completed by him with the addition in paragraph 1 of the words "sued as (*the name stated on the Writ of Summons*)".
4. Where the Defendant is a **FIRM** and an attorney is not instructed, the form must be completed by a **PARTNER** by name, with the addition in paragraph 1 of the description "Partner in the firm of (.....)" after his name.
5. Where the Defendant is sued as an individual **TRADING IN A NAME OTHER THAN HIS OWN**, the form must be completed by him with the addition in paragraph 1 of the description "trading as (.....)" after his name.
6. Where the Defendant is a **LIMITED COMPANY** the form must be completed by an Attorney or by someone authorised to act on behalf of the Company, but the Company can take no further step in the proceedings without an Attorney acting on his behalf.
7. Where the Defendant is a **MINOR** or a **MENTAL PATIENT**, the form must be completed by an Attorney acting for a guardian *ad litem*.
8. A Defendant acting in person may obtain help in completing the form at the Courts Office.
