ORIGINATING SUMMONS

TO: Henry Caradine Hill whose address for service is PO Box 1497GT, Grand Cayman.

LET THE DEFENDANT, Henry Caradine Hill within 14 days after service of this Summons on them, counting the day of service, return the accompanying acknowledgement of service to the Court office, P. O. Box 495 GT, George Town, Grand Cayman.

BY THIS SUMMONS which is issued on the application of the Plaintiff, Cayman National Bank Ltd, the Plaintiff seeks relief pursuant to the Registered Land Law (1995 Revision).


- 1) On 2nd December 1991 the Plaintiff as Chargee, and the Defendant as Chargor executed a legal charge ("the Legal Charge") in respect of the land and building registered at the Lands and Survey Department as Cayman Brac East, Block 111E, Parcel 27 ("the Property"). The said Legal Charge was granted by the Defendant in consideration of the Plaintiff granting facilities for loans and/or overdrafts and continuing to give time for payment of such facilities and/or further time and facilities to a Customer of the Plaintiff, Mrs. Teresa Rose Hill ("the Customer"). The said Legal Charge was registered at the Lands and Survey Department on 9th December 1991.
- 2) The Charge provided, inter alia, that:
 - 2.1) The principal sum secured by way of the Charge was the principal sum of CI\$21,000.00.
 - 2.2) Interest on the principal sum would accrue at the rate of 4% over the CI Base Rate.
 - 2.3) The principal sum shall be repayable on demand made by the Plaintiff of the Defendant regardless of whether as against the Customer, the due date for payment of the principal sum or any part thereafter had arrived.
 - 2.4) Immediately upon default by the Defendant in payment of the principal sum or of any interest payable thereunder, or in the performance and observance of any agreement, expressed or implied, the Plaintiff would be entitled to serve notice

upon the Defendant to pay the money owing or to perform and observe the agreement as the case may be and further so as to provide that if the Defendant did not comply within one month of the date of service of such notice, the Plaintiff may thereupon either appoint a Receiver of the income of the Property or sell the Property the subject of the security by private treaty as well as by public auction.

- 3) Further, on 17th August 1993, the Defendant entered into a Variation of Charge increasing the principal sum from CI\$21,000.00 to CI\$36,000.00. The interest rate was increased to 5% over the CI Dollar Base Rate. The said Variation of Charge was registered with the Land Registry on 22nd September 1993.
- 4) In or about January 2002, the Customer failed to make the necessary payments in respect of her indebtedness to the Plaintiff.
- 5) By a letter dated 6th June 2002, sent by registered post, the Plaintiff duly served notice on the Defendant and the Customer pursuant to the Registered Land Law (1995 Revision) demanding payment of the balance of the principal sum and accrued interest which, as at 6th June 2002, amounted to CI\$26,005.70 (principal) and CI\$285.21 (interest).
- 6) A further demand was served on the same date pursuant to Section 72 of the Registered Land Law (Revision) claiming the same sums.
- 7) Despite the service of such notices, the Defendant and Customer have failed to pay the balance due of the principal sum, and accrued interest.
- 8) The Property consists of residential premises. It is believed that the property is occupied by the Defendant and the Customer.
- 9) The provisions of the Registered Land Law (1995 Revision) provide that once a Notice of Demand has been served, pursuant to Section 64 (2) the total amount of principal and interest becomes payable three months after service of that Notice. The Plaintiff avers that the letter dated 6th June 2002 served on the Defendant as aforesaid, constitutes Notice under Section 64(2) of the Registered Land Law (Revised).
- 10) The provisions of the Registered Land Law (1995 Revision) also provide that if default is made in payment of the principal sum, or any interest, and continues for one month, the Chargee will then acquire a power to sell the property by public auction after three months have elapsed, from service on the Chargor of a second notice demanding payment. Such provisions are subject to variation with the approval of the Court to allow the Chargee to sell by either private sale or public auction, without the service of a second notice.
- 11) The Legal Charge in this action contains such a variation to the Statutory procedure and by this Originating Summons, the Plaintiff seeks the approval of the Court to the exercise of the powers under those provisions in the Legal Charge. The Plaintiff asserts that, in any event, it has served the appropriate notices under Section 64(2) and Section 72 of the Registered Land Law (Revision).

- 12) The relief the Plaintiff therefore seeks in these proceedings is an Order of the Court that:
- 12.1) The Plaintiff be entitled to sell the Property and that such sale be by either private treaty or public auction in good faith and having regard to the interests of the Defendant;
 - 12.2) That the Plaintiff be entitled to vacant possession of the Property for the purposes of a sale of the Property;
 - 12.3) After the sale of the said Property in accordance with the Order sought herein, should there be any shortfall in the amount due and owing to the Plaintiff that the Plaintiff be at liberty to enter Judgment against the Defendant for the said shortfall, together with interest and costs;
 - 12.4) The costs of these proceedings be added to the principal and interest due from the Defendant and be deducted from the proceeds of sale.
