1. A declaration that the Defendants are in default of payment of the principal sum payable to the Plaintiff and secured by a Charge described below:

between the Defendants and the Plaintiff, Scotia Holdings Limited (formerly named Scotiabank (Cayman Islands) Ltd.) ("the Charge"), by virtue of which the property in the Registration Section Lower Valley, Block 32C, Parcel 4 was charged by the Defendants in favour of the Plaintiff to secure the principal sum of CI\$315,000.00 and interest at the rate specified in the schedules thereto.

2. A declaration that the Defendants are in default of payment of the principal sum payable to the Plaintiff and secured by a Collateral Charge described below:
 - Registered on 6th June 2001 and identified as instrument #4070/01;
made between the Defendants and the Plaintiff, Scotia Holdings Limited (formerly named Scotiabank (Cayman Islands) Ltd.) ("the Charge"), by virtue of which the property in the **Registration Section Lower Valley, Block 32C, Parcel 260** was charged by the Defendants by way of legal charge in favour of the Plaintiff to secure the principal sum of CI\$315,000.00 and interest at the rate specified in the schedules thereto.
2. Delivery by the Defendants to the Plaintiff of possession of the Properties.
3. An order that the Charge be enforced by the sale by private treaty of the Properties (as well as by Public Auction).
4. An Order determining the terms and conditions of sale by private treaty, if any.
5. Such further or other relief as the Court thinks fit.
6. Costs on an indemnity basis as set out in the pleaded Charges.

AND LET THE DEFENDANTS within 14 Days after service (within 28 days of service if served out of the jurisdiction) of this summons on them counting the day of service, return the accompanying Acknowledgement of Service to the Courts Office.

Attorney: where the Defendant is represented by an attorney, state the attorney's place of business in the Cayman Islands. A Defendant may not act by a foreign attorney.

Defendant in person: where the Defendant is acting in person, he must give his post office box number and the physical address of his residence or, if he does not reside in the Cayman Islands, he must give an address in Grand Cayman where communications for him should be sent. In the case of a limited company, "residence" means its registered principal office.

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DIRECTIONS FOR ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF SERVICE OF ORIGINATING SUMMONS

The accompanying form of *Acknowledgement of Service* should be completed by an Attorney acting on behalf of the Defendant or by the Defendant if acting in person. After completion it must be delivered or sent by post to the Law Courts, P.O. Box 495G, George Town, Grand Cayman.

Notes for Guidance

1. Each Defendant (if there are more than one) is required to complete an Acknowledgment of Service and return it to the Court's Office.
2. If you wish to defend claims made in the originating summons, or intend to attend the proceedings and to participate in them so far as necessary (although not necessarily in an adversarial manner) you should tick the "Yes" box in paragraph 2 of the acknowledgment of service.
3. For the purpose of calculating the period of 14 days for acknowledging service, a writ served on the Defendant personally is treated as having been served on the day it was delivered to him.
4. Where the Defendant is sued in a name different from his own, the form must be completed by him with the addition in paragraph 1 of the words "sued as (*the name stated on the Originating Summons*)".
5. Where the Defendant is a **FIRM** and an attorney is not instructed, the form must be completed by a **PARTNER** by name, with the addition in paragraph 1 of the description "Partner in the firm of (.....)" after his name.
6. Where the Defendant is sued as an individual **TRADING IN A NAME OTHER THAN HIS OWN**, the form must be completed by him with the addition in paragraph 1 of the description "trading as (.....)" after his name.
7. Where the Defendant is a **LIMITED COMPANY** the form must be completed by an Attorney or by someone authorised to act on behalf of the Company, but the Company can take no further step in the proceedings without an Attorney acting on its behalf.
8. Where the Defendant is a **MINOR** or a **MENTAL PATIENT**, the form must be completed by an Attorney acting for a guardian *ad litem*.
9. A Defendant acting in person may obtain help in completing the form at the Courts Office.
