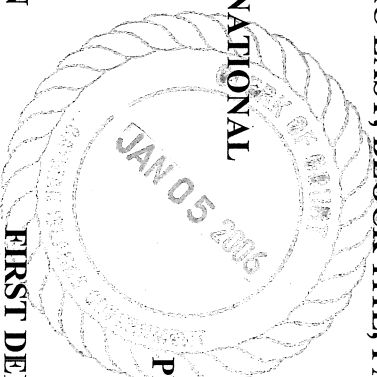
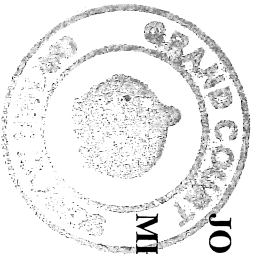

ORIGINATING SUMMONS


BY THIS SUMMONS which is issued on application of the Plaintiff, FirstCaribbean International Bank (Cayman) Limited of PO Box 695 GT, 22 Main Street, Grand Cayman, the Plaintiff claims against the Defendants relief pursuant to the Registered Land Law (1995 Revision) as follows:-

1. The variations in the Plaintiff's charge to the provisions of the Registered Land Law (1995 Revision) be allowed.

2. The Plaintiff be entitled to sell the Defendants' property by either private treaty or public auction in good faith and having regard to the interests of the Defendants and this Honourable Court do give directions as to the sale price of the property.
3. The Plaintiff be entitled to vacant possession of the property.
4. Any further relief this Honourable Court may deem appropriate.
5. The Plaintiff also seeks an Order that if after any sale of Parcels 8, 11 and 12 there should be any shortfall in the amount due and owing to the Plaintiff that the Plaintiff be at liberty to enter judgment for such shortfall, together with interest and costs.

The grounds upon which the Plaintiff seeks the relief set out above are contained in the Affidavit lodged at Court.

Address for service:

Notes on address for service

Attorney: where the Defendant is represented by an attorney, state the attorney's place of business in the Cayman Islands. A Defendant may not act by a foreign attorney.
Defendant in person: where the Defendant is acting in person, he must give his post office box number and the physical address of his residence or, if he does not reside in the Cayman Islands, he must give an address in Grand Cayman where communications for him should be sent. In the case of a limited company, "residence" means its registered principal office.

DIRECTIONS FOR ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF SERVICE OF ORIGINATING SUMMONS

The accompanying form of Acknowledgment of Service should be completed by an Attorney acting on behalf of the Defendant or by the Defendant if acting in person. After completion it must be delivered or sent by post to the Law Courts, P. O. Box 495GT, Grand Cayman.

Notes for Guidance

1. Each Defendant (if there are more than one) is required to complete an Acknowledgment of Service and return it to the Courts Office.
2. If you wish to defend claims made in the originating summons, or intend to attend the proceedings and to participate in them so far as necessary (although not necessarily in an adversarial manner) you should tick the "Yes" box in paragraph 2 of the acknowledgment of service.
3. For the purpose of calculating the period of 14 days for acknowledging service, a writ served on the Defendant personally is treated as having been served on the day it was delivered to him.
4. Where the Defendant is sued in a name different from his own, the form must be completed by him with the addition in paragraph 1 of the words "sued as (the name stated on the Originating Summons)".
5. Where the Defendant is a FIRM and an attorney is not instructed, the form must be completed by a PARTNER by name, with the addition in paragraph 1 of the description "Partner in the firm of (.....)" after his name.
6. Where the Defendant is sued as an individual TRADING IN A NAME OTHER THAN HIS OWN, the form must be completed by him with the addition in paragraph 1 of the description "trading as (.....)" after his name.
7. Where the Defendant is a LIMITED COMPANY the form must be completed by an Attorney or by someone authorised to act on behalf of the Company, but the Company can take no further step in the proceedings without an Attorney acting on its behalf.
8. Where the Defendant is a MINOR or a MENTAL PATIENT, the form must be completed by an Attorney acting for a guardian ad litem.
9. A Defendant acting in person may obtain help in completing the form at the Courts Office.
